

Civil Justice Association of California Amicus Panel FAQs

1. What is the deadline to apply?

November 1, 2023.

2. How many lawyers will be on the amicus panel?

• We estimate a minimum of 10-15 outside appellate counsel.

3. Why is CJAC putting together this amicus panel?

CJAC has a well-established amicus program that has been active for decades. With the passing of our long-time amicus leader, there are new opportunities for program leadership.

4. Can lawyers self-nominate?

No. Applicants must be nominated by a CJAC board member or staff.

5. Who will lead the amicus panel?

A CJAC-designated appellate counsel. CJAC is also <u>requesting applications</u> for this position.

6. How many briefs does CJAC file per year?

Approximately 12-14.

7. What are the usual topics of focus for CJAC amicus briefs? Can I see examples?

CJAC amicus submissions have historically covered a broad range of civil liability and procedure topics. Visit cjac.org/appellate-center for example topics and recent briefs.

8. How often will the amicus panel meet and will meetings be virtual?

Generally meetings will be bi-monthly and by video conference.

9. Is there a brief quota?

No, but members are expected to be active in merits discussions and periodically write briefs.

10. Will amicus panel members be able to participate in CJAC events and access CJAC members?

- o Amicus panel members will be listed on CJAC's website and materials seen by CJAC members.
- Panel members will also receive a discounted rate for <u>CJAC Legal Advisory Board</u> membership which includes access to CJAC events and legislative, appellate, and regulatory newsletters.

11. If I write the brief, will I be listed as counsel on CJAC amicus briefs?

Yes. Amicus submissions will be under CJAC's name with primary drafter listed as counsel.

12. Will I get paid for writing CJAC amicus briefs?

- o Generally, amicus panel members will be expected to write letter briefs (such as in support of review, publication, or depublication) on a pro bono basis.
- Merit briefs will be pro bono or a modest flat fee may be provided, to be determined at the outset of the brief.

13. Will briefs I write be edited? If so, by whom?

 Briefs will be subject to review and editing for consistency of CJAC voice and brand. The editor will generally be a CJAC-designated appellate counsel at an outside firm.
